

Pupil Premium

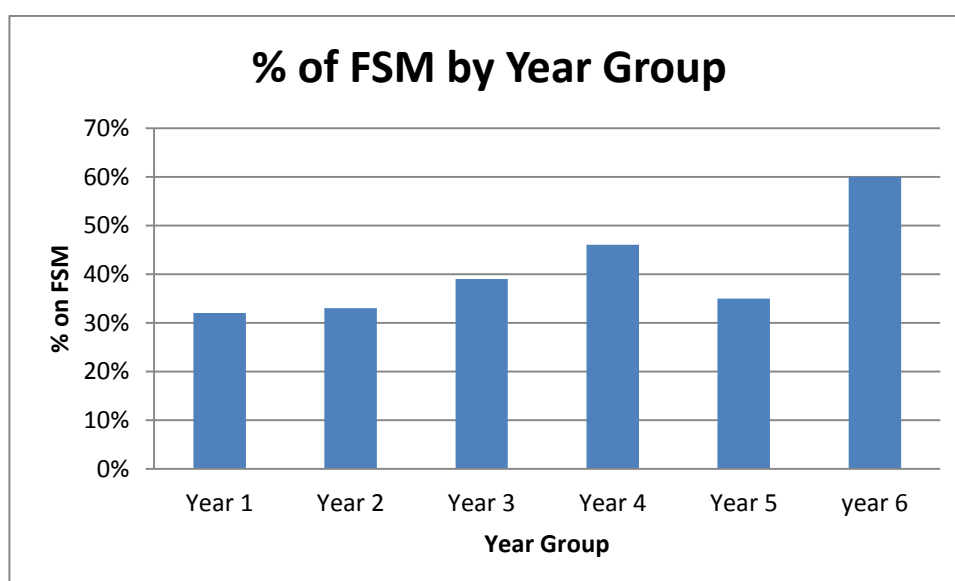
Context

The school receives a Pupil Premium for children registered as having free school meals (FSM) or having had FSM at any point in the last six years (this is known as Ever6). There is also a pupil premium for the children of service personnel and looked after pupils. Over the last 4 years we have received the following amounts.

A breakdown of FSM by year group clearly indicates children lower down the school are less likely to be FSM. The low numbers in the early years are explained by the fact all School meals have been free in Newham for the last 4 years. There has been a local authority initiated drive to ensure the at all eligible children are registered for pupil premium. Given the level of funding involved it is important that we continue to support this initiative and ensure the maximum number of families are registered. Over the last four years funding has significantly risen, however given the lower numbers in the early years the school will need to plan and budget for a decline in income.

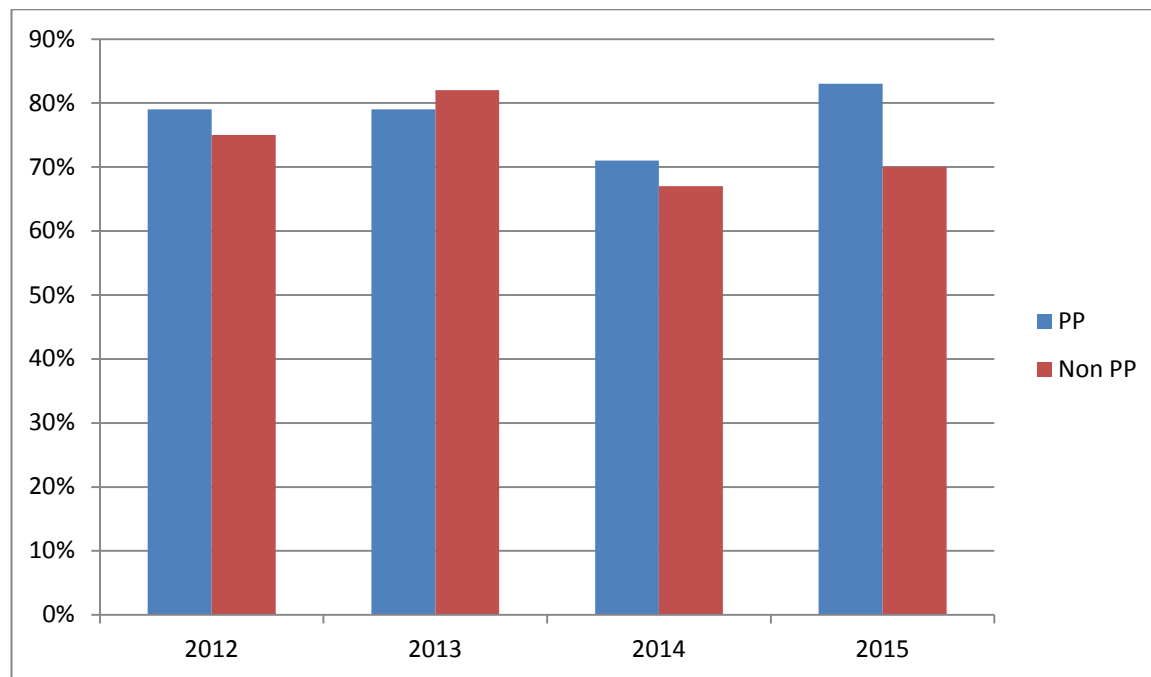

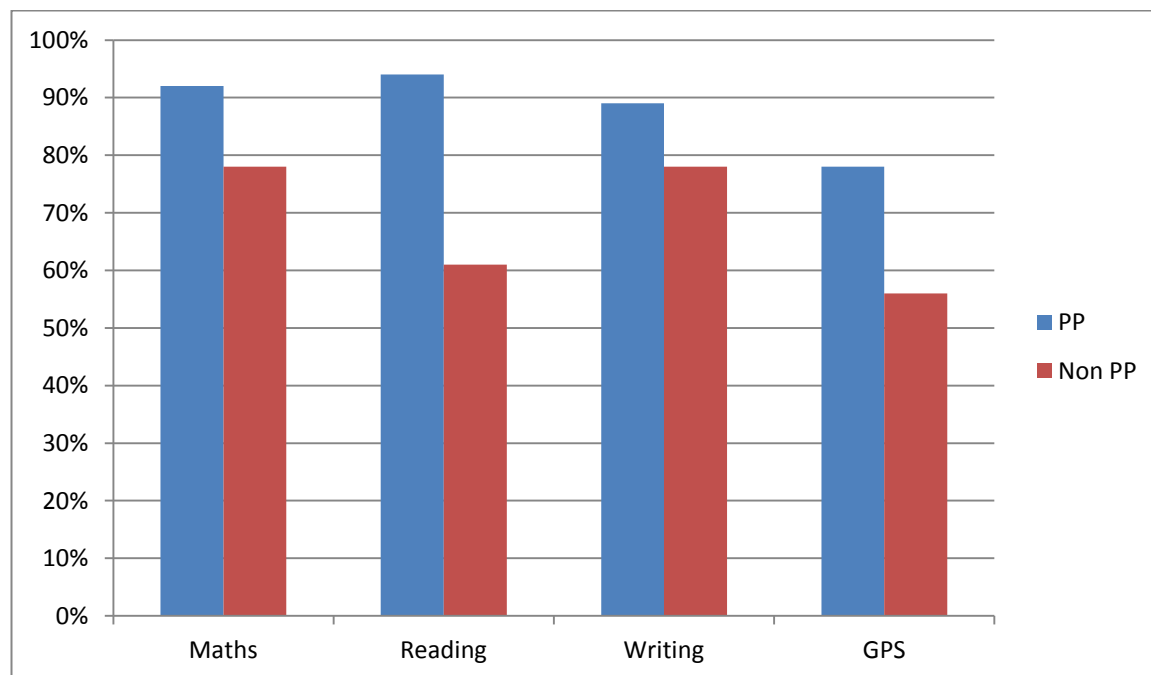
Impact

Our data clearly indicates that the school is using pupil premium effectively to close the gaps. When looking at a four year trend it obvious that FSM children are beginning to outperform their peers. Below is a summary of the assessment data we have that proves the positive impact of the way we spend the pupil premium.

It is worth noting that given the size of intake that these figures can be easily distorted by a few individuals. The figures for this year suggest that pupils receiving pupil premium have outperformed non FSM pupils when using combined Level4+ as a measure. It is worth noting that FSM pupils out performed Non FSM pupils in all areas other than English Grammar, Punctuation & Spelling.

Year group	What does our data analysis tell us about the relative attainment and achievement of FSM and non-FSM pupils for each year group? Are there any gaps? Is there evidence of closing gaps compared with previous years' data?
Year 1	The non PP children slightly outperformed the PP children for reading, writing and maths for attainment. The non PP children also outperformed the non PP children for reading, writing and maths.
Year 2	The PP children made above the national expectation for progress across reading, writing and maths. For reading the PP children are in line with the national average (2b). For writing the children are at the lower end of the national average (2c). For maths the children are at the national average. The PP children outperformed the non PP children in reading (0.1) but the non PP children outperformed the PP children in writing (0.2) and maths (0.4)
Year 3	The PP children made more than expected progress (2+ sub levels) but were outperformed by the non PP children. The PP children's attainment is below for writing and maths (2b). Their reading is at the bottom end of the national average (2a). The non PP children are at the bottom end of the national average (2a) for reading and writing and at the national average for maths. It is worth noting that there are a lot of PP children who are also on the SEND register.
Year 4	The PP children made more than expected progress for maths, reading and writing and outperformed the non PP children across all subjects. The PP attainment is just above the non PP children across reading, writing and maths. The year group is at the national average for reading and maths but just below for writing.
Year 5	The PP children's progress was outperformed by the non PP children for reading, writing and maths. The PP children did not make expected progress. The PP children's attainment is at the national average for reading and maths was slightly below for writing. They PP outperformed the non PP children who are slightly below for reading and maths but well below for writing.
