

### STAMPING ON STEM WEEK

In January, Year 1 to Year 6 were taking part in STEM week all thanks to Mr Francis and Miss Van Der Westhuizen (STEM=Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths)

Year 1 were making rockets and designing various shapes and sizes. Meanwhile Year 2 found waterproof materials for Red Riding hood. That sounds as fun as Year 3 designing a maze for a BlueBot and programing it to get out of the maze! Years 5 were being engineers, building tall towers out of newspaper that don't blow over. Year 6 were doing similar, but with bridges. They were testing their bridges by putting weights on them and seeing how much weight it could stand.
