I hope that you received our first **Safeguarding newsletter** which we sent out in February. Thank you to those parents who took the time to thank us for it, and tell us that they had found it useful. The intention is for these newsletters to go out monthly, and for each issue to have a different focus around safeguarding the children. If there are any specific areas that you would like more information about then please let us know and we can include that in a future edition. If you have any questions about anything in any of the safeguarding newsletters then do please talk to one of the Safeguarding Team to ask them.



We took part in **Safer Internet Day** this year- a world-wide event to ensure safe and responsible use of the internet. Classes took part in discussions around the responsibilities that we all have as internet users. Three of our school's core values of community, respect and responsibility were discussed. What became clear throughout the discussions is the significant amount of time that some of our children are spending on devices playing games. It is really important that parents are aware of the content that these games have. Often, the game appears innocent but due to the online element, some of the discussions between players contain inappropriate language. If you have any questions in helping keep your child safe online or would like support in learning about setting parental controls on your devices, please see Mr Buckley.

Thank you to all of you who attended **Parents' Evening**. It was a busy afternoon / evening, and it was good to see so many of you there. I hope that you found it useful, and now have some good ideas about what it is your child now needs to be focusing on in the second half of the school year. Thank you to all of you who took the time to leave a Google review for the school – it was a pleasure reading them, the comments were really heart-warming.



Don't forget that we have another **Open Day** coming up shortly which is an opportunity to once again see Manor in action! We have altered the date of it as we wanted it to coincide with STEM Week (more on that below). This half term, this will be on Monday 18<sup>th</sup> March. As this is our STEM week we will be offering you the opportunity to learn more about this important area of the curriculum. We'll be holding an information session at 9.30am and this will be repeated at 2pm – we hope to see as many of you there as possible. Of course, as always, you're very welcome to spend some time (or even the day) with your child.

This week, **Year 5** are visiting one of London's most famous landmarks - the Tower of London - as part of their Crime and Punishment Topic. The Tower was previously one of the country's most notorious prisons and, whilst there, the children will have the opportunity to explore what life was like for prisoners throughout history.

**Year 4** are very fortunate to have been invited to take part in Mission X, at Eastlea Community School. This is an amazing opportunity for the children to experience a very fun, exciting and challenging project. They will explore the science involved in space travel, including fitness and nutrition to tie in with their 'You Are What You Eat' topic.

Just before half term, **Year 3** were very fortunate to explore the University College London's Petrie Museum of Egyptology all by themselves. We frequently visit museums at Manor, but rarely do we get the place to ourselves! The children were fascinated with the artefacts and had many questions when working beside two fantastic curators. 

# COMIC RELIEF



Please encourage your child to visit the book shed - all books are labelled so that they can be correctly returned to the shed and not the other reading areas around the school.

The timing of the book shed fits well with **World Book Day**. This year, we will be celebrating this day on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> March. It is a great opportunity for your children to dress up as their favourite book character and celebrate the joy of reading. Please remember that you do not have to go and spend a fortune on a ready-made costume; the charm of this day is in being creative and using the resources you already have around your home to create your costume whether that is a hat, an iconic object or a full blown costume, the day is more about having fun and celebrating our love of books together. As well as dressing as their character, we would like the children to go 'in-role' as their character.

During this week there will be a real focus on these subject areas as we raise their profile with the children. There are plenty of exciting activities and opportunities planned for the week. Last half term, you will remember that we had an **art project** with the focus of **'The Great Ocean Clean Up'**.
